## **Faculty Prizes for Excellence in Teaching**

*The Faculty Prizes for Excellence in Teaching were established in 1982 by the HMS Faculty Council to be “conferred annually to faculty who, through their excellence in teaching, would impact and influence the professional lives of students long after graduation.”*

### **Donald O’Hara, PhD Faculty Prizes for Excellence in Teaching**

*The Faculty Prizes for Excellence in Preclerkship Teaching are named in memory of Donald O’Hara, PhD, who was a beloved teacher of Harvard medical students. Dr. O’Hara also served as one of the leaders of the New Pathway Chemistry and Biology of the Cell course and as co-director of the HST course Human Biochemistry and Metabolic Diseases. Dr. O’Hara was also a recipient of the Faculty Prize for Excellence in Teaching for his teaching of first-year medical students.*

#### **Michael Dougan, MD, PhD**

Associate Professor of Medicine  
Massachusetts General Hospital

Dr. Michael Dougan is an Associate Professor of Medicine at Massachusetts General Hospital and Harvard Medical School. He leads the immunology component in the Foundations course, is co-director of the Immunology AISC with his colleague and wife, Dr. Stephanie Dougan, and teaches clinically at MGH. His students had this to say about him, “Dr. Dougan is one of the best (if not the best) teachers I have ever had in my formal education. He speaks with stunning clarity about complex topics in immunology, breaking things down at a level that encourages us to build both our own intellectual repertoire of immuno-physiology and also to develop our own capacity to tackle complex clinical problems.” They noted, “when he doesn't know something, it's not that he doesn't know - it's that science doesn't know. Truly an institution for HMS even this early into his career and someone who should always, always be teaching students.”

#### **Ari Wassner, MD**

Associate Professor of Pediatrics  
Boston Children’s Hospital

Dr. Ari Wassner is Medical Director of the Thyroid Center, Director of the Endocrinology Fellowship Training Program at Boston Children's Hospital (BCH), and Associate Professor of Pediatrics at Harvard Medical School. Dr. Wassner is actively involved in education and received the 2017 Masland Award for Excellence in Teaching from Boston Children’s Hospital. He also serves on the BCH Graduate Medical Education Committee and is a member of the Academy at Harvard Medical School. In addition to his involvement in resident and fellow education, he directs preclinical medical education in Endocrinology at Harvard Medical School. As a teacher, he is described as “one of the most engaging instructors I've had during my time at HMS.” Overall, students felt that “although studying endocrinology for the first time can be very daunting ... Dr. Wassner presents the information in a way that makes it intuitive and even fun to learn.”

## **Charles McCabe, MD Faculty Prizes for Excellence in Teaching**

*The Faculty Prizes for Excellence in Clerkship Teaching are named in memory of Charles McCabe, MD, who was a beloved teacher of Harvard medical students and who also served as the director of the Core Clerkship in Surgery at Massachusetts General Hospital for more than two decades. Dr. McCabe was also a recipient of the Faculty Prize for Excellence in Teaching on multiple occasions for his teaching of third-year medical students.*

### **Alex Keuroghlian, MD, MPH, MSc**

Associate Professor of Psychiatry  
Massachusetts General Hospital  
The Fenway Institute

Dr. Alex Keuroghlian is the Director of the Division of Education and Training at The Fenway Institute, the Michele and Howard J. Kessler Chair and Director of the Division of Public and Community Psychiatry at Massachusetts General Hospital (MGH), and the director of the MGH Psychiatry Gender Identity Program. At Harvard Medical School, he is a co-director of the HMS Sexual and Gender Minority Health Equity Initiative, clerkship director for the HMS advanced elective in sexually and gender diverse health, and co-director of the HMS Advanced Integrated Science Course (AISC) in Sex- and Gender-Informed Medicine. In his nomination, students celebrated him as “an excellent educator, receptive to feedback, and always involved in facilitating classroom engagement.” It was noted that “it was evident that he really cared about the course and worked to diversify the experiences ... by bringing a range of patients, physicians, advocates, leaders, and researchers.” Furthermore, “he made himself as available as possible to talk one-on-one about topics outside of class, encouraged honest reflection assignments on the course material, and encouraged student wellness.” Importantly, he “really fostered a loving and supportive class ... and demonstrated all the key aspects that a truly skilled educator could possibly bring to a classroom environment.”

### **Haatem Reda, MD**

Instructor in Neurology  
Massachusetts General Hospital

Dr. Haatem Reda is a neurologist at Massachusetts General Hospital, where he serves as the Site Director of the Neurology Clerkship and the Associate Director of the Advanced General and Autoimmune Neurology Fellowship. In his nomination, students lauded him as a “masterful clinician with an unparalleled neurological exam... It is not this amazing clinical prowess that leads me to nominate Dr. Reda, but instead, his incredible willingness to share his skills.” His teaching also “displayed a patience and thoroughness that is enviable.” He was lauded for taking “time to deconstruct our approach to each clinical case and collaborate with us in building up our understanding piece by piece, creating a novel picture of the patient that allowed for both learning and improved care.” Finally, one student stated, “I hope I can be an excellent clinician in the mold of Dr. Reda, though I aspire even more to be as inspiring a teacher.”

## **Leo A. Blacklow, MD Teaching Award Mount Auburn Hospital**

*The Leo A. Blacklow Award is presented annually to an outstanding teacher who holds joint appointments at Harvard Medical School and Mount Auburn Hospital. The award honors Dr. Leo A. Blacklow, HMS 1930, who practiced Family Medicine in Belmont and at Mount Auburn Hospital. For over 60 years, he helped train residents and medical students while caring for five generations of families in Belmont and surrounding communities. Dr. Blacklow was a passionate advocate for education and an enduring role model for comprehensive and compassionate care for all.*

### **David L. Hudacek, MD**

Assistant Professor of Medicine

Dr. David Hudacek is the Assistant Director of the Hospitalist Program at Mount Auburn Hospital. He teaches HMS and HST HMS and MIT students at both the student and Sub-Intern levels. In nominating him for the Blacklow Award, trainees and colleagues commented that he “is a class act. His knowledge base is amazing.” He “stands out as a true educator on the wards teaching teams.” In addition, a nominee commented that Dr. Hudacek “has enthusiasm for the craft and is always prepared to teach his learners at the bedside. He is engaging and raises the bar for the residents to learn and to provide exceptional care for their patients.”



## **Stephen B. Calderwood Medical Student Teaching Award Massachusetts General Hospital**

*The MGH Stephen B. Calderwood Medical Student Teaching Award was established in 2021 and is awarded to the Harvard faculty member who has demonstrated the highest overall excellence in teaching of Harvard Medical School student at MGH. This award is voted by medical students who complete the Principal Clinical Experience (PCE) at MGH and is the highest honor granted for undergraduate medical education at MGH. It replaces the former Bulfinch Award for Undergraduate Medical Education at MGH, which was established in 2012.*

### **Laura Avery, MD**

Assistant Professor of Radiology

Dr. Laura Avery is an Emergency Radiologist at Massachusetts General Hospital. Dr. Avery graduated from Wayne State Medical School in Detroit, Michigan, and completed her residency and fellowship at MGH. Dr. Avery has practiced Emergency Radiology for 15 years. Her career is focused on radiology education, and her administrative responsibilities include serving as the Harvard Medical School Radiology Clerkship Director. Dr. Avery has won numerous teaching awards from students, trainees, and colleagues. Her dedication to education was recognized by awarding her the Robert Novelline Endowed Chair of Radiology at MGH. Dr. Avery has been recognized as an Honored Educator by the RSNA.

## **Sandra & Arnold Gold Award for Humanistic Teaching at Cambridge Health Alliance**

*The Sandra and Arnold Gold Award for Humanistic Teaching at Cambridge Health Alliance is named in honor of Drs. Sandra and Arnold Gold and their remarkable decades-long contributions to humanistic medical education nationally and locally. The award is presented annually to an inspirational HMS faculty educator at Cambridge Health Alliance who models compassion, integrity, respect, and service in teaching HMS medical students, residents, fellows, or peers.*

### **Marie-Louise Jean-Baptiste, MD**

Assistant Professor of Medicine

Dr. Marie-Louise Jean-Baptiste (Malou), primary care physician, recent medical director of Cambridge Healthcare for the Homeless, and Director of Minority Affairs, has been a beloved member of the Cambridge Health Alliance teaching faculty since 1989 and has mentored medical students, public health students, residents, and peers from HMS, Haiti, and many places in between! She is “a full clinician and a full healer. She also brings this healing way to her teaching of students, residents, and colleagues.” One resident noted, “It is the lessons I learned from Dr. Jean-Baptiste that have made me the kind of doctor that patients want to come back to see. Dr. Jean-Baptiste reminds those around her of the power of listening, asking, and endeavoring to understand where others come from.” And from a colleague, “She made me feel competent. She believed in me and helped me to trust and believe in myself. Not many teachers can do that. She is one of a kind.”

## **Bernard Lown Award for Excellence in Teaching Brigham and Women's Hospital**

*The Bernard Lown Award for Excellence in Teaching at Brigham and Women's Hospital (BWH) was established in 2010 to celebrate physicians who are outstanding clinical teachers and to recognize the very significant role that education plays in carrying out the BWH mission and the institution's deep commitment to the next generation of clinicians. The award honors Dr. Bernard Lown, senior physician at BWH, Professor of Cardiology Emeritus at the Harvard School of Public Health, and founder of the Lown Cardiovascular Center and Lown Cardiovascular Research Foundation. A gifted clinician, renowned bedside teacher, and research pioneer, Dr. Lown was named Master Teacher of the American College of Cardiology on five occasions. He co-founded International Physicians for the Prevention of Nuclear War (IPPNW) with Dr. Evgeni Chazov of the former Soviet Union; in 1985, they were co-recipients of the Nobel Peace Prize on behalf of IPPNW.*

### **Scott B. Lovitch, MD, PhD**

Assistant Professor of Pathology

Dr. Scott Lovitch is a hematopathologist and molecular diagnostic pathologist at Brigham and Women's Hospital. He has taught medical students at HMS since he was a resident. He co-directs the Foundations course and is core faculty in the Homeostasis I pathophysiology course for first-year medical students. Since 2018, he has been the Morgan-Zinsser Associate Director for the Pathways Pathology Curricular Theme at HMS, responsible for the integration of pathology across all phases of the MD curriculum. He also co-directs courses on best practices in pathology education and promoting diversity, inclusion, and equity in pathology at the annual meeting of the United States and Canadian Academy of Pathology (USCAP). Dr. Lovitch has won multiple awards for teaching and innovation in medical education, including being selected as one of "40 Under 40" by the American Society of Clinical Pathology and being selected by HMS students to receive the Donald O'Hara Faculty Prize for Excellence in Teaching. Dr. Lovitch has demonstrated an extended, strong commitment to and an infectious aptitude for teaching, mentoring, advising, and leadership in medical education, which is the focus of his academic career. Students say, "He was the first instructor to remember all our names." and that "He is just so good at explaining and visualizing the concepts, he creates so much room for us to ask questions and knows how to actually answer our questions, not just go on a long rant that is only tangentially related."

### **Sonja R. Solomon, MD**

Instructor in Medicine

Dr. Sonja Solomon is a primary care physician in the Division of General Internal Medicine at BWH. She has held significant leadership positions in both undergraduate and graduate medical education, including BWH Site Director for Practice of Medicine and Associate Site Director for the Internal Medicine Clerkship. Currently, she serves as Director of the DGM Primary Care Residency at BWH. In her present role, she oversees all aspects of primary care training for a cohort of 24 residents, including continuity clinics, curriculum, special programming, mentoring, feedback, career advising, and intern recruitment. Since 2018, she has implemented a major revision of the curriculum; supported the development of a longitudinal partnership between the residency and the community-based Sportsmen's Tennis and Enrichment Center in Dorchester; reformed the residency interview process to improve standardization and reduce the effects of implicit bias; and has championed the recruitment of a diverse cohort of residents. She continues to teach HMS students in her primary care clinic, in clerkship learning conferences, at morning report, and on the inpatient wards. She is known

for her rigorous, dynamic, and inclusive teaching style. She has received local and regional awards for teaching and education leadership excellence. *“Dr. Solomon has an unparalleled commitment to student and resident education.”* The students and interns said, *“Dr. Solomon has been exactly the mentor, leader, and clinical educator I hoped I would find in my career.”* They go on to say, *“Dr. Solomon plays an essential role in allowing each of us to feel welcome and included in our education and community-building. I am in awe of Dr. Solomon’s ability to carefully listen to and identify my concerns.”*

## **Robert P. Masland, Jr. Teaching Award Boston Children's Hospital**

*Dr. Robert P. Masland, Jr. was the Chief of Adolescent/Young Adult Medicine at Children's from 1967 to 1993 and was a leader in establishing the field of Adolescent Medicine, as well as teaching communication and professionalism. In addition, he trained generations of medical students, residents, and faculty members at Boston Children's Hospital. He was a supporter of flexible careers and work-life balance long before these issues were openly discussed. As a medical educator, Dr. Masland served as Co-Director of the Combined Harvard Medicine/Pediatrics Training program and as Associate Master of the Cannon Society at HMS. One of his favorite activities was mentoring HMS students and trying to convince them to pursue a career in pediatrics. As Chair of the Intern Selection Committee at Boston Children's Hospital from 1983-2002, he sought to rank as many HMS students as possible. Dr. Masland died in 2010, and this award was established in his honor to recognize a Children's Hospital faculty member who shares Dr. Masland's passion for teaching medical students.*

### **Mary P. Mullen, MD, PhD**

Associate Professor of Pediatrics

Dr. Mary P. Mullen, MD, PhD, is an attending physician in the Department of Cardiology at Boston Children's Hospital (BCH) and the Director of the Pulmonary Hypertension Service. She is a founding member and current Vice Chair of the Pediatric Pulmonary Hypertension Network (PPHNet), a national effort to define the clinical syndromes and outcomes and develop clinical innovations for pediatric pulmonary hypertension. At HMS, she leads the Advanced Elective Working Group (formerly subcommittee) and is a key member of the Post-PCE Subcommittee. Throughout her career, she has participated in almost every level of the curriculum for medical students at HMS. Most notably, she served as a preceptor in Patient-Doctor II, mentored students in HST 160, helped design and implement Homeostasis 1, was a clinical preceptor and coordinator in the Regenerative Medicine and Stem Cell AISC, and continues to direct the advanced elective in pediatric cardiology at BCH. This elective is arguably our hospital's most popular and sought-after elective. Furthermore, every encounter Dr. Mullen has with learners, whether students, residents, fellows, or colleagues, receives accolades. In their evaluations, students describe her as a fantastic and generous teacher who finds time for learning on even the busiest services and is always approachable. She is a consummate role model, and one student commented that "she models phenomenal patient-centered care, from clinical efficiency to rapport with her patients. I aspire to be like Dr. Mullen someday." From the viewpoint of an education administrator, Dr. Mullen is always the clerkship director willing to take one more student. Clearly, Dr. Mullen is passionate about teaching students and the perfect choice to receive the 2023 Masland Award.

## **S. Robert Stone Award for Excellence in Teaching Beth Israel Deaconess Medical Center**

*The S. Robert Stone Award for Excellence in Teaching has been awarded annually since 1981 to a member of the Harvard Medical School faculty at Beth Israel Deaconess Medical Center (BIDMC) for outstanding achievement in the teaching of medical students and house staff. The award is given in honor of the late Honorary Trustee and past Board Chairman of the former Beth Israel Hospital by his children.*

### **Jeffrey William, MD**

Assistant Professor of Medicine

Dr. Jeffrey William is the Associate Program Director of the Nephrology fellowship training program at the Beth Israel Deaconess Medical Center in Boston. He serves as a Firm Chief of the Tullis Firm within BIDMC's Internal Medicine Residency program. He is a Core Faculty member of Harvard Medical School's integrated pathophysiology course, Homeostasis 2, now Integrated Human Pathophysiology 3. He received the 2017 Donald O'Hara Faculty Prize for Excellent in Pre-Clerkship Teaching and the HMS Class of 2020 Award for Excellence in Classroom Instruction. His clinical interests span electrolyte disorders to chronic kidney disease and hypertension management to complex dialysis patients and home dialysis. His educational research interests include curriculum design and innovation.

## **L. James Wiczai Award for Leadership, Excellence, and Innovation in Medical Education**

*The Wiczai Award was established in 2000 by Karen C. Kirby in memory of her husband, L. James Wiczai, to honor a staff member who fosters innovation and excellence in medical education and promotes collaboration between Harvard Medical School and the Harvard-affiliated hospitals.*

### **Amanda Perry**

Course Coordinator, POM, and PCE  
Brigham and Women's Hospital

Amanda Perry was nominated for her contributions to the organization of the Practice of Medicine (POM) course and the Principal Clinical Experience (PCE) at Brigham and Women's Hospital (BWH). She was lauded by the BWH faculty with whom she works for her outstanding management of the Practice of Medicine course at BWH. Dr. Mary Montgomery noted that she is "truly one of the best people whom we have worked with at HMS/BWH. The Practice of Medicine is a very long and complicated course. During the two years [she has been in this role], Amanda has completely revolutionized the way that we manage and run the entire course. She not only beautifully handles any complication that arises but has put systems in place that will anticipate and prevent most problems. We have often thought that the administrative aspects of this course are overwhelming, but the course is now running like a plane on autopilot with Amanda as the captain. Amanda is often working to organize aspects of the course that are months ahead. To accomplish this, she has taught herself how to code in Canvas (the course's online management system), has become skilled at developing and refining PowerPoint slides, and has dedicated herself to understanding even the most intricate details of medical student training at HMS. She is kind and compassionate to our students, with students frequently noting to our course leadership how amazing Amanda is to work with. She is also both dedicated and brilliant, helping us to navigate through many difficult student cases. Under Amanda's leadership, we, as faculty in the POM course, have been better able to foster the skill development of our students. Amanda is truly a superstar, and we feel so lucky [to] have gotten to learn from her and to be her colleague."

## **Richard A. Gillis Award for Excellence in Medical Education**

*The Richard A. Gillis Award for Excellence in Medical Education was established in 2012 in memory of Rick Gillis (1953-2011), Executive Director of Curriculum Programs, whose 27 years of contributions to the MD program at Harvard Medical School exemplify the standards of excellence and the work ethic he inspired in those who were privileged to know him and to work with him. The award is given to a member or members of the HMS staff for their outstanding contributions to the educational mission of the School. This award serves as a reminder of Rick's legacy and the critical role of staff in facilitating, in the words of his hero, President John F. Kennedy, "the infinite potential of the human mind that can be realized through education ... [and that] can be translated into benefit for everyone and greater strength for our Nation."*

### **Sally Bartlett**

Associate Director of Curriculum Administration  
Office of Medical Education

Sally Bartlett's contributions to the Program in Medical Education in her current role as Associate Director of Curriculum Administration in the OME and her previous roles in the Office of Curriculum Services have been exemplary, and many of the faculty leaders in the PCE recognized her invaluable contributions in nominating her for this award. Among their many observations of her contributions to clinical education, they noted, "Sally truly exemplifies the utmost professionalism no matter the circumstance, going above and beyond to get the job done. She is an amazing colleague and such a valuable resource in problem-solving and taking initiative. She has joined meetings on several occasions when she was technically on vacation because there was nobody else available and has never once complained." "Sally is exceptional at anticipating the needs of a course or program. She has initiative, integrity, and an amazing creative problem-solving ability to get ahead of the many challenges often found in curricular development. On top of it all, she is kind, thoughtful, passionate, and an amazing human being." "She is always reliable, precise, and responsible. She is warm, engaging, and positive--always bringing her best and always bringing out the best in others. Universally, I and my colleagues laud her many abilities, her high-level work, and her service-mindedness. She is also full of good ideas, deep thinking, and an excellent communicator. Sally is an excellent listener, respectful, and tremendously prepared. She seems to be ever-available, at "the ready," and never rushed (how she does that so ably is a wonderful mystery to us all!)." She is well known for her efforts to promote excellence in psychiatric education and her exceptional commitment to the well-being and training of medical students. This award serves as a tribute to Dr. Kettyle's contributions to the art of teaching psychiatry.*

## **Jonathan F. Borus Outstanding Early Educator Award in Psychiatry**

*The Jonathan F. Borus Outstanding Early Career Educator Award in medical student education in psychiatry has been awarded since 2011 to a junior faculty member at Harvard Medical School who has demonstrated exceptional promise, initiative, and commitment in the area of psychiatric education. The award is named in honor of Jonathan F.
